- Entries should be typewritten/computerized, double-spaced and contain a maximum of 800 words and a minimum of 500 words.
- 3. The essay should not bear the contestant's name, school, or grade level. However, a separate sealed envelop containing the entriy form shall be attached. Both entries and the envelope shall be coded by the Division Coordinator before it will be submitted for judging. Entries for the Regional and National level shall also be coded.
- The DECS ranking system in the selection of essay contest winners shall be used.
- The school principal should forward the school's winning entry to the respective DECS-DO not later than October 20, 2000.
- 6. English shall be the medium to be used.
- 7. Relatives of NPC/DOE employees in the first degree of consaguinity shall be disqualified from joining the contest.
- 8. Parents of the three (3) national finalists shall sign a waiver allowing their children to go to Manila to participate in the grand national finals.

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Top 5 Questions about the Electricity Industry Reforms

What does 'restructuring' mean? What is 'pavatization'?

The restructuring of the electricity industry, calls for the especiation of the different components of the power sector, framely, generation, transmission, distribution and supply. On the other hand, the privatization of the National Power Corporation (NPC), involves the sale of the state-owned power firm's generation and transmission issues to get a power plants and transmission lines) to private investors. These two reforms are almied at impouraging greater competition and at attracting more private sector investments in the power industry. A more dompatitive power industry will in turn result in lower power rates and a more efficient delivery of electricity supply to end-users



Why is there a need to privatize NPC?

About US\$ 10 billow wanth of new investments will have to be channelled to the power sactoroger the next 10 years to meet the country's growing electricity requirements silven its present debt stock of about P800 billion NPC counteral price to find anymore the additional power plants that have to be put up to meet this rising definance, it can seek financial assistance from the national government, but specially hard-pressed for funds, given its other priority pregrams like health education and agriculture



What will now happen to NPC's debts? Are consumers supposed to shoulder these debts?

As mentioned rearlier, NFC will self-life generation and transmission assets to private investors through a public hidding that will his conducted with the utmost transparency and in compiliance with the standards of the international competitive bidding process. The proceeds of this asset sale, estimated at F220 billion, will then be used to retire part of NPC's debts. At the same time future owners of NPC's liabilities.

Finally, the national government will also absorb part of the total liabilities. Government has assured that its absorption of part of NPC's debts will not result in the imposition of new laxes or in higher power rates.

As for the consumers, all electricity users — from billy industries to typical households — are actually already paying for part of NPCs debts. This is because of the average effective rate of P3 per knowatt-hour now being charged by NPC, roughly P0 50 goes to retiring NPC's liabilities. In short, NPC's existing power rates already reflect the cost of paying its debt burden.

Will power rates go down once NPC is privatized?

Yes! The proposed power reforms are designed to enjourage greater competition in the electricity industry, in particular, the generation and supply sub-weights. The basic principle that deregulating makes an industry more efficient has been proving this when government opened up such key sectors as telecommunications, air transportation, and the shipping hidustry to private investors. Now, we have several telecom companies compaling for clustomer attention through cheaper call rates and better services. Airfares likewise went down following the operation of additional arine.

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Other countries that have pursued the privatization process experienced lower power rates following the introduction of key reforms in the electricity sector. In Argenthia, for example, power rates dropped by a dramatic 44 percent as a result of privatization. Australia and New Zealand, on the other thand, also reported power rate reductions of 36 percent and 14 percent respectively. Finally, in the United Kingforth whose privatization experience is being used as a model by the Philippines rates went down by 25 percent after the successful completion of power industry reforms



What will happen if the Power Bill is not enacted into law?

Unless and until it is privational. With any no choice but to resort to more porrowings to be able to fund future power projects. With no financial assistance from the government either NPC will be forced to redover from its power relegion cost of undertaking these capital intensive projects. This will mean higher power relegion consumers. On the other hand, failure to install additional generation capacity and to expand existing transmission line networks will lead to a shortfall in power supply. Under such a scenario, the country might expenence 8- to .0-hour daily brownouts ag. 1 as it did in the late 1980s and early 1990s
