#### **COURSE INFORMATION**

Course 103: Postgraduate Diploma in Applied Linguistics

(Postgrad. Dip. Appl. Ling.) 05 July – 27 November 2004

(Important:

This document should be read by all applicants prior to completing the application form for admission as a candidate to the Postgraduate Diploma Course.)

#### Rationale

The Postgraduate Diploma Course is meant to provide the participant information and understanding of major developments in the field of applied linguistics in order to enable him/her to undertake a practitioner's/programme developer's responsibilities with an awareness of language and language pedagogy related factors that require attention.

#### **Objectives**

- 2. By the end of the course, participants should have acquired at least:
  - (a) a knowledge of the principles of analysis of language, of linguistic theories on the structural, psychological and social aspects of language and an awareness of how this knowledge can contribute to language teaching;
  - (b) an overview of the main current theoretical approaches to explaining second language acquisition and development;
  - (c) an understanding of the major approaches and methods in second language teaching;
  - (d) the principles of basic statistical methods for carrying out simple statistical analyses.

#### Course of Study

#### 3. Core Modules

All four core modules are compulsory.

## (a) Grammar in Discourse (30 hours/6 credits)

The module focuses on a socio-cultural perspective to the study of language which provides systematic links with the contexts of use. Texts as instantiations of language use will form the basis of the development of the course.

The analyses of the grammatical patterns of organisation in various texts such as Cohesion, Theme-Rheme, Transitivity Patterns and Modality will enable the teacher to make explicit linguistic statements about the language in use. This in turn will empower learners with the linguistic tools for both learning to learn and to use language more meaningfully.

# (b) Language Acquisition: Social & Psychological Dimensions (30 hours/6 credits)

The module will present an overview of the major theoretical approaches to language acquisition. Drawing from developments in psycholinguistics and sociolinguistics, it will build an awareness of the complex nature of language learning. Course participants will have the opportunity to consider and discuss the implications of research in second language learning for learning and teaching languages in the Southeast Asian region.

# (č) Language Teaching Methodology (30 hours/6 credits)

The language teaching component provides an overview of methodology in which the fundamental theoretical considerations are related to second/foreign language learning. It will deal with a description of 'method' and what this involves and review approaches to language teaching as well as describe recent trends and emphases in the field.

# (d) Research Methodology (30 hours/6 credits)

The module aims to acquaint course members with basic principles of how to read the research of others and how to conduct and present their own project. Prominent research paradigms will be discussed, as course members read reports of studies in which these paradigms were applied. The key parts of a research report will be described and exemplified. Course members will complete a special project as part of this module.

#### 4. Elective Modules

Not all elective modules may be available during any particular year. Only two elective modules are required.

#### (a) Language Curriculum Design and Implementation (30 hours/6 credits)

The module aims to enable course members to analyse the major curricular initiatives from historical, political, ideological and socio-economic perspectives and to utilize the understanding thus gained in a study of language curricula under both existing and emerging paradigms. The understanding thus achieved will be used to gain better awareness of curricular innovations in Southeast Asia.

#### (b) Language Testing (30 hours/6 credits)

The language testing component deals with the theoretical foundations of language testing, the relationship between teaching and testing, construction and evaluation of different types of language tests, analysis of test results, scoring and grading.

#### (c) Discourse Analysis (30 hours/3 credits)

The module focuses on the nature of cohesion and coherence in discourse. It will deal with general features of discourse phenomena in both written and spoken texts with the aim of understanding how communication is achieved in these two mediums. Classroom research and the analysis of classroom interaction will be specifically treated. Course members will be encouraged to apply some of the models described to the analysis of classroom talk.

#### (d) English for Specific Purposes (30 hours/6 credits)

The module introduces the principles and practice of teaching English for Specific Purposes (ESP). It will enable course members to assess the language needs of specific groups of learners, identify and describe the use of language in relation to specific purposes, develop appropriate materials and design activities that develop relevant language skills.

#### (e) Materials Design and Development (30 hours/6 credits)

The module will deal with the principles and techniques of designing instructional materials for all levels of learning taking into account current innovations in the teaching and learning of languages. The module will also provide for practical work in writing, selecting, and adapting materials as well as in evaluating existing instructional materials.

#### (f) Varieties of English (30 hours/3 credits)

The module aims to study the English language in use in different parts of the world and in the various functions that the language performs as mother tongue and as a second/foreign language. It will also examine the various policy-planning, sociolinguistic and educational issues that arise in each case.

# (g) Teaching Reading and Writing (30 hours/6 credits)

The module will acquaint course members with recent theoretical insights into reading and writing processes. Practical implications will be explored. The module will also provide them with opportunities to give indepth consideration to issues of particular relevance to Southeast Asia.

# (h) Teaching Listening and Speaking (30 hours/6 credits)

The module will acquaint course members with current knowledge in the teaching and learning of listening and speaking and also provide opportunities for studying a range of tasks of relevance to oracy teaching and learning. Provision will be made for practical experience in adapting and designing usable listening and oracy tasks.

# (i) Media Resources in ELT (30 hours/6 credits)

The module will examine both principles and techniques for applying the use of audio, video and computer technology to the English language classroom. At the same time, this module will be forward looking and should help to break the techno-phobia from which many teachers suffer.

# (j) Language and Culture (30 hours/6 credits)

The module will examine the relationship between language, culture and society in general and language education in particular. Language is viewed as a resource for expressing and making meanings in its cultural context. In a context where the local languages come face to face with a language that is significantly different from that of their own, there are problems faced by both learner and teacher. Some of these issues will be dealt with in the course.

#### Seminars

5. Seminars will be organised on topics of professional interest to course members. These are intended to provide course members with an opportunity to benefit from instruction by visiting senior specialists and language consultants.

#### Course Requirements

- 6. All course participants will have to pass all four core modules and two elective modules. The core modules will be assessed by an examination and assignment(s) each and the elective modules by assignment(s) each.
- 7. Participants must satisfy class attendance requirements in all class sessions and seminars.
- 8. A participant whose progress has not been satisfactory may be required to terminate his/her candidature.

#### Course Award

9. The course will lead to the award of Diploma in Applied Linguistics.

#### Admission Requirements

- 10. Candidates must possess a Bachelor of Arts degree or other acceptable qualification in an area approved by RELC. Consideration may be given to a mature candidate without this qualification who in the opinion of RELC will profit from the programme.
- 11. The candidate must have had a minimum of two years of language teaching experience or a minimum of two years of experience in language planning and language development programmes.
- 12. The candidate must have sufficient command of English to follow advanced studies conducted in the English language and to prepare written and oral assignments.

#### **Objectives**

- 2. The objectives of the course are to:
  - (a) examine the types of multimedia resources available to today's English language teachers;
  - (b) discuss the pedagogic application of multimedia technology in the English language classroom.

Course 105: Postgraduate Diploma in Applied Linguistics

(Part-time)

07 June 2004 – 11 June 2005

(Important:

This document should be read by all applicants prior to completing the application form for admission as a candidate to the Postgraduate Diploma Course.)

### Rationale

The Postgraduate Diploma Course is meant to provide the participant information and understanding of major developments in the field of applied linguistics in order to enable him/her to undertake a practitioner's/programme developer's responsibilities with an awareness of language and language pedagogy related factors that require attention.

### Objectives

- 2. By the end of the course, participants should have acquired at least:
  - (a) a knowledge of the principles of analysis of language, of linguistic theories on the structural, psychological and social aspects of language and an awareness of how this knowledge can contribute to language teaching;
  - (b) an overview of the main current theoretical approaches to explaining second language acquisition and development;
  - (c) an understanding of the major approaches and methods in second language teaching;
  - (d) the principles of basic statistical methods for carrying out simple statistical analyses.

### Course of Study

3. All six modules are compulsory. The hours for each module will consist of 21 hours of lectures plus a self-study package taking a minimum of 9 hours per module.

### (a) Grammar in Discourse (30 hours/6 credits)

The module provides a socio-cultural perspective to the study of language which provides systematic links with the contexts of use. Texts as instantiations of language use will form the basis of the development of the course.

The analyses of the grammatical patterns of organisation in various texts such as Cohesion, Theme-Rheme, Transitivity Patterns and Modality will enable the teacher to make explicit linguistic statements about the language in use. This in turn will empower learners with the linguistic tools for both learning to learn and to use language more meaningfully.

## (b) Language Acquisition: Social & Psychological Dimensions (30 hours/6 credits)

The module will present an overview of the major theoretical perspectives of language acquisition. Drawing from developments in psycholinguistics and sociolinguistics, it will build an awareness of the complex nature of language learning. Course participants will have the opportunity to consider and discuss the implications of research in second language learning for learning and teaching languages in the Southeast Asian region.

### (c) Teaching Reading and Writing (30 hours/6 credits)

The module will acquaint course members with recent theoretical insights into reading and writing processes. Practical implications will be explored. The module will also provide them with opportunities to give indepth consideration to issues of particular relevance to Southeast Asia.

### (d) Teaching Listening and Speaking (30 hours/6 credits)

The module will acquaint course members with current knowledge in the teaching and learning of listening and speaking and also provide opportunities for studying a range of tasks of relevance to oracy teaching and learning. Provision will be made for practical experience in adapting and designing usable listening and oracy tasks.

### (e) Language Testing (30 hours/6 credits)

The language testing component deals with the theoretical foundations of language testing, the relationship between teaching and testing, construction and evaluation of different types of language tests, analysis of test results, scoring and grading.

### (f) Research Methodology (30 hours/6 credits)

The module aims to acquaint course members with basic principles of how to read the research of others and how to conduct and present their own. Prominent research paradigms will be discussed, as course members read reports of studies in which these paradigms were applied. The key parts of a research report will be described and exemplified. Important concepts will be discussed. Course members will complete a special project as part of this module.

### Course Requirements

- 4. Course participants would have to pass all six modules. For each module the participant has to do the following:
  - (a) Written examination.
  - (b) Complete one or more written assignments.
  - (c) Satisfy class attendance requirements in all class sessions.
- 5. A participant whose progress has not been satisfactory may be required to terminate his/her candidature.

### Mode of Delivery

6. Class sessions will be scheduled during the June and December school vacation.

### On-Line Learning Support

7. RELC lecturers will be available for consultation by email as well as in person. In addition, a web community will be specially created for this course, through which participants will be able to download course materials and additional lecture notes, post questions on the web, and discuss issues raised in the sessions.

### Other Resources

8. Participants are encouraged to use the library facilities available at RELC.

### Course Award

9. The course will lead to the award of Diploma in Applied Linguistics.

### Admission Requirements

- 10. For admission as a candidate for the Postgraduate Diploma in Applied Linguistics a person must possess a Bachelor of Arts degree or other acceptable qualification in an area approved by RELC. Consideration may be given to a mature candidate without this qualification who in the opinion of RELC will profit from the programme.
- 11. The candidate must have had a minimum of two years of language teaching experience or a minimum of two years of experience in language planning and language development programmes.
- 12. The candidate must have sufficient command of English to follow advanced studies conducted in the English language and to prepare written and oral assignments.

The course is conducted jointly by RELC and the National University of Singapore (NUS) and the degree is conferred by NUS.

### Rationale

The general aim of the Master of Arts (Applied Linguistics) Course is to provide a qualification relevant to graduate teachers assuming leadership roles in the language teaching, research and development programmes of educational institutions.

### Objectives

- 2. By the end of the course, candidates will have:
  - (a) a knowledge of the principles of analysis of language, of linguistic theories on the structural, psychological and social aspects of language and an awareness of how this knowledge can contribute to language teaching;
  - (b) an overview of the main current theoretical approaches to explaining second language acquisition and development;
  - an understanding of the major approaches and methods in second language teaching;
  - (d) an understanding of the principles and methods used in applied linguistics research.

### Length of Course

- 5. The course leading to the degree of Master of Arts (Applied Linguistics) will have a maximum candidature of 36 months of full-time study or 48 months of part-time study from the commencement of the programme. The maximum periods include the time allowed for approved study leave but may exclude periods of leave of absence subject to the approval of RELC and NUS.
- 6. A full-time candidate must offer at least three modules but no more than five modules in a semester. A part-time candidate must offer at least one module but no more than two modules in a semester.
