2008 STAND UP, TAKE ACTION CAMPAIGN AND NATIONAL WEEK FOR OVERCOMING EXTREME POVERTY

- 1. Pursuant to Presidential Proclamation No. 717, series of 2004, declaring October 17-23 of every year as the National Week for Overcoming Extreme Poverty, the United Nations initiated in 2006 an exciting and innovative global challenge called Stand Up Against Poverty. The international campaign for this year is "Stand Up, Take Action Against Poverty and for the Millennium Development Goals."
- 2. The Department of Education (DepED), which is a core member of the National Anti-Poverty Commission (NAPC), together with the other government agencies, the basic sectors and other non-government organizations and private sectors shall take part in the implementation of activities lined up for the occasion. DepED's participation will include those of the central, regions, divisions and schools including students in the elementary school level, both public and private.
- 3. The local theme of the celebration is "Mag-ina'y Sagipin. Bata'y Pagaralin" (Save Mother and Newborn. Send Children to School). This is so because among the MDGs, MDG 1 (Alleviating poverty and hunger), MDG 2 (Universal primary education), and MDG 5 (Improving maternal health) are least likely to be achieved by year 2015. All actions for this year's campaign shall revolve around any of the three goals. All actions shall take place from 8:00 am on October 7, 2008 (Friday) to 5 p.m. on October 18, 2008 (Saturday).
- 4. As DepED's major "Stand Up, Take Action" activity, gardening and tree-planting activities shall be organized in all public and private elementary schools nationwide at 3:00 p.m.-5:00 p.m. on Friday, October 17, 2008. All school staff, teachers and students shall plant vegetables and/or fruit-bearing trees within the school and/or the community. Seedlings and other planting materials may be produced in school nurseries or secured in coordination with the Municipal/City Agriculture Offices and the local DENR offices. Eventually, the vegetable and fruit harvests will be part of the school feeding program that will benefit the school community.

- Before the activity, teachers shall briefly present the Millennium Development Goals to students in all classrooms to inculcate awareness on the UN and government's efforts towards poverty reduction. (Please see Enclosure No. 2, Guide to Teachers in Discussing the Millennium Development Goals).
- Wherever possible, schools shall also hold other "Stand Up, Take Action" activities such as the following:
 - a. The Child Find Program. School officials will identify children who have enrolled at the start of the school year but have stopped schooling, or children of school age within the community who are not in school, and invite them with their parents to a meeting before October 17, 2008 to find out why they are not in school and to discuss what should be done to bring them to school. School officials will monitor the list, and a quarterly report on the number of children back in school will be submitted to the Office of the Secretary, through Assistant Secretary Teresita G. Inciong;

b. Child Sponsorship. Support the activities of partners and donor agencies that will raise funds for the education of indigent

c. Mobilize partners from the Adopt-A-School Program to sustain their efforts in rehabilitating more public schools to accommodate more enrollees; and

- d. Conduct essay writing, drawing, or poster-making contests among students using the abovestated theme to enhance knowledge, understanding and appreciation of the MDGs.
- All events that will be undertaken shall be registered using the enclosed registration form together with a SUTA brochure (Enclosure No. 1).
- All DepED offices and schools are also enjoined to display the Commemoration Banner in their respective areas.
- Regional Directors (RDs) and Schools Division Superintendents (SDSs) and School Heads are requested to supervise and monitor the conduct of the aforementioned activities.

- Worldwide 980 million people live on less than US\$:
- 27.6 million Filipinos are poor
- 33 out of 100 Filipinos are poor
- Only 84% of Filipino children of school age are enrolled
- Only 70% of Filipino children complete primary school
- More than 4,000 Filipino women die during pregnancy every year, or an average of 11 per day
- Poor women lack access to RH services, resulting in half a million abortions every year
- The number of HIV and AIDS cases are increasing; to July 2008 increase of 133% reported monthy from 2005

The UN Millennium Development Goals

The Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) is a development plan that all countries and all leading development institutions worldwide have agreed to adopt to help the world's poorest countries and lead them to progress. The general goal is to cut in half the number of people living in absolute poverty by 2015.

What are the MDGs?

- 1. Eradicate extreme poverty and hunger
 - Reduce by 50 percent the following: (1) Number of Filipinos living in extreme poverty between 1990 and 2015; (2) Number of Filipinos who get lower than the minimum level of dietary energy consumption; and (3) Number of underweight children under five years old
- 2. Achieve universal primary education
 - All Filipino children should have elementary school education by 2015
- 3. Promote gender equality and empower women
 - All females and males should have equal opportunity in primary and secondary education, preferably by 2005, and in all levels of education no later than 2015
- 4. Reduce child mortality
 - Reduce by two-thirds the number of children who die before the age of five
- 5. Improve maternal health
 - Reduce by 75 percent the number of women who die giving birth and increase access to reproductive health services to 60 percent by 2010, and 80 percent by 2015
- 6. Combat HIV/AIDS, malaria and other diseases
 - Stop the spread of HIV and AIDS, malaria and other major diseases by 2015
- 7. Ensure environmental sustainability
 - Implement national strategies to reverse loss of environmental resources by 2015
 - Bring down the number of people with no access to safe drinking water and basic sanitation for those who cannot afford it by 2015
 - Achieve a significant improvement in the lives of at least 100 million slum dwellers by 2020
- 8. Develop a global partnership for development
 - Improve the trading and financial system, deal comprehensively with the debt problems of developing countries, and provide access to affordable essential drugs

Are we meeting the targets?

Halfway through 2015 – the target year to achieve the Millennium Development Goals – the Philippines has made considerable progress particularly in poverty reduction, nutrition, reducing child mortality, combating HIV and AIDS, malaria and other diseases and access to safe drinking water and sanitary toilet facility. But the country needs to work harder on MDG 2 (Universal Primary Education) and MDG 5 (Maternal Mortality).

MDG 2: Universal Primary Education

Access to primary education worsened in School Year 2005-2006. It showed a decline in the net enrolment rate – the number of children enrolled in elementary education – from 96.8 percent in 2000 to 84.4 percent in SY 2005-2006. The weak ability of the government to provide complete basic education services in more than 7,000 barangays in the country may be one of the reasons for the deterioration of the enrollment rate. If this trend continues, it may set back our 2015 target of providing primary education for all Filipino children.

MDG 5: Maternal Mortality

Decline in number of maternal deaths per 100,000 live births has slowed down, from 209 deaths in 1993 to 162 death in 2006. Since then, it has not showed further improvements. In view of this, the goal of reducing it to 52 by 2015 is also unlikely to be met.
