PRIMER ON THE RE-ACTIVATION OF THE OPCC

WHAT IS THE OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT COORDINATING CENTER (OPCC)?

The OPCC is an ad-hoc body under the Office of the President that operates on a 24-hour basis, to provide efficient flow of timely information to the President on evolving critical issues and developments in the country for the duration of his foreign visits.

The OPCC was initially activated during the State Visit to Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia on 26-30 January 1997, and was last activated on 13-16 October 1997 during the President's visit to Hongkong, Myanmar and Laos. Because of the need to establish a high level monitoring and reporting system that will cover all sectors and issues nationwide, the OPCC will be re-activated for the duration of the President's trip to the United States and Canada from 18 November to 3 December 1997.

WHAT ARE THE FUNCTIONS OF THE OPCC?

The OPCC is primarily tasked to:

- a) provide timely information to the President on evolving critical issues and developments during the period through the regular submission of OPCC bulletin;
- b) provide a feedback system among and between agencies and the Office of the President in carrying out the President's directives while in Canada and the United States;
- c) provide a channel of coordination and collaboration in the management of government affairs during the President's absence;
- d) conduct regular meetings concerning the situation and functions of the center; and,

- b) undertake other activities that may be directed by the President.

WHAT IS THE OPCC OPERATING STRUCTURE?

The OPCC will be under the overall supervision and responsibility of the Executive Committee with the Executive Secretary as Chairman, the Secretaries of National Defense, and Interior and Local Government as Vice Chairman, and the National Security Adviser, Chief Presidential Legal Counsel, Senior Deputy Executive Secretary, Head of the Presidential Management Staff and Press Secretary as members of the Executive Committee of EXECOM.

The OPCC involves the participation and cooperation of departments and agencies under the Executive Branch to be grouped into the following operating units:

- a. The Expanded Task Force Lilly which is headed by the Senior Deputy Executive Secretary (SDES) and composed of the NIA/PA, SRA, PNP/DILG, DFA, DND, DFR/DOF, NBT/DOO, MGC/NEA/DOE, DOCC, MSS/DEWA, OWWA/DOLE, DTC, RMRA, CPS, CP/Legal, PAGE, CESVI, NICA, Mt. Pinatubo Commission, and the Presidential Assistant for Political Affairs, Military Affairs, Police Affairs and Legislative Liaison, as members.
- b. The Counterpart Coordinating Centers which shall be established in all Departments and Agencies including Government-owned and Controlled Corporations; and
- c. The Regional Coordinating Centers which shall be composed of heads of all regional offices nationwide.

- The OPCC shall be supported by the following groups:
- a) The Media Support Group which shall be composed of the Office of the Press Secretary as lead agency, PR groups of government agencies including SCIOs and other outfits involved in media and communication.

- b) The OPCC Secretariat which shall be composed of PMS staff and senior officials; And,
- c) The RCC Secretariat which shall be composed of the PNP Regional staff.

WHERE WILL THE OPERATING UNITS AND SUPPORT GROUPS BE LOCATED?

The OPCC operating units and support groups shall be located in the following venues:

Expanded Task Force Lily	- 4th Floor of the New Executive Building
Media Support Group	- Office of the Press Secretary, Kalayaan Hall, Malacañang
OPCC Secretariat	- 8th Floor, PMS Building
RCC and RCC Secretariat	- PNP Regional Command Headquarters
Counterpart Coordinating Centers	- respective Offices

WHO CAN BE DESIGNATED AS REPRESENTATIVES FOR THE OPCC OPERATING UNITS AND SUPPORT GROUPS?

Expanded Task Force Lily - senior officials of at least Undersecretary or Assistant Secretary (for departments) or head of agency, deputy head of agency or senior manager/director (for other agencies) who will undertake 12-hour shifts.

Counterpart Coordinating Centres (CCCs) - shall operate under the supervision of duly-designated action officers with ranks of at least Undersecretary or Assistant Secretary (for departments) or should be head of agency, deputy head of agency or senior manager/director (for other agencies). The said action officers should have access to their department/agency heads on a 24 hour basis.

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Regional Coordinating Centers - designated senior officials of at least Director III/IV or should be the head/deputy of the regional offices who will undertake 12 hour shifts.

Media Support Group - shall be supervised by a senior official of the OPS with the rank of at least an Assistant Secretary. Its personnel and duty officers will undertake 12 hour shifts.

OPCC Secretariat - shall be composed of PMS personnel and supervised by a senior official will operate on a 24-hour basis.

RCC Secretariat - shall be composed of PNP regional staff who shall operate on a 24 hour basis.

HOW CAN OPERATIONAL LINKAGES BE MAINTAINED BY THE ORDER

- a. The OPCC may call upon any government agency or instrumentality to participate and cooperate in monitoring initiatives. In this regard, all Cabinet Members and Heads of Agencies must provide the OPCC Secretariat with phone numbers where they can be reached.
- b. All CGCs must submit a list of the names and phone numbers of their designated action officers to the OPCC Secretariat prior to the re-activation of the OPCC.
- c. The OPCC Secretariat shall also keep a directory of all PNP Regional Offices.

WHO SHALL UNDERTAKE OVERALL SUPERVISION FOR THE OPCC AND WHAT ARE ITS DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES?

- a. The OPCC Chairman, Vice Chairman, or a member of the Executive Committee shall supervise the operation of the OPCC on a 24 hour rotation basis.
- b. The OPCC Chairman or OPCC Duty Officer (Vice Chairman or a member of the Executive Committee ~~regularly~~) shall sign OPCC Bulletins/reports to the President.

The OPCC Chairman shall submit a terminal report to the President upon closure of the OPCC operations which will include: major developments during the OPCC and other major events after the last OPCC Bulletin; and, any/all overall assessment of the OPCC operation; and, the participation of all involved agencies.

WHAT WILL THE OPCC OPERATING UNITS AND SUPPORT GROUPS REPORT ON AND HOW OFTEN SHOULD REPORTS BE SUBMITTED?

Expanded Task Force Duty - shall focus monitoring and coordinating activities on security, peace and order, and other critical issues, and monitor (i.e., rice, oil, situation, calamity, power situation) and submit reports to the OPCU, through the Secretariat, at 4 hours intervals or as often as necessary.

Counterpart Coordinating Centers - monitor and submit reports on their respective sectors to the OPCU, through the Secretariat at 6 hours intervals or as often as necessary.

Regional Coordinating Centers - focus monitoring and coordinating activities on regional developments and activities and submit reports directly to the OPCC, although the Secretariat may 8 hours intervals or as often as necessary.

Media Support Group - monitor and assess tri-media reports, prepare press statements on actions taken on issues, and concerns raised by the media based on inputs provided by the SBS or OPCU and ensure the dissemination of press statements to tri-media networks.

OPCC Secretariat - provide overall technical and administrative support to the OPCC, including consolidation of monitoring reports for submission to the OPCC Chairman/Excom Duty Officer.

RCC Secretariat - provide overall technical and administrative support to the RCC, including consolidation of monitoring reports of the RCC for submission to the OPCC, through the Secretariat, for overall integration.

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WHAT ARE THE STANDARDS AND FORMATS TO BE OBSERVED IN THE PREPARATION OF OPCC REPORTS?

Reports prepared for the OPCC must conform to the guidelines and standards set by the President. Incident reports must be straight-forward. Merit presentation of data would not be sufficient. Issues/incidents reported must have national impact for the President to immediately identify his decision or action points. Reports must be brief, contain and supported by appropriate statistics in the form of annexes. Reports must be validated and confirmed by concerned department/agency.

The report should have the following content and should observe the following format:

Assessment of the Situation: This should be able to provide information or details on the current situation about the issue or sector (what, when, why, who, how, how much). It must be able to provide an evaluation of the impact (or) severity of the issues or concern being reported. This shall also indicate trends or historical background, as appropriate.

Actions Taken: The content of the report must be able to summarize specific actions taken by concerned department/agency and coordination work being undertaken, with other departments/agencies, NGOs, and concerned sectors.

Plan of Action: This should be able to outline courses of action to be undertaken by concerned department/agency in the immediate, short and medium term period. Based on completed staff work, it must indicate if Presidential action or intervention is required, such as, appropriate memorandum/documents.

The OPCC report should be signed by the Excom member on-duty or his duly designated representative at the end of the duty-shift.
