Former speaker Jose de Venecia Jr. reportedly called Mrs. Arroyo an "ingrate," while opposition Sen. Jamby Madrigal said she was a "tiyanak (demon-infant)."

Earlier, Senate witness Rodolfo Lozada Jr. claimed that Commission on Higher Education Chairman Romulo Neri called Mrs. Arroyo "evil" during a meeting with opposition senators last December. But Neri said he could not recall ever making the remark. Gina de Venecia, wife of the former speaker, also said she had heard Neri refer to Mrs. Arroyo as "evil."
