President Arroyo and her "very lean" delegation were scheduled to leave for Libya past midnight today instead of Sunday late afternoon departure as an-nounced by the Department of Foreign Affairs (DFA) on Saturday.

The DFA said Mrs. Arroyo will have a full schedule in Tripoli, Libya where she will hold bilateral meetings with the heads of state and government of South

Asian and African states Asian and African states.

The President and her delegation, composed of Foreign Affairs Secretary Alberto Romulo, Labor Secretary Marianito Roque, and Foreign Affairs Undersecretary for Special Concerns Rafael Seguis, were scheduled to leave Manila at 12:10 a.m. today.

uled to leave Manila at 12:10 a.m. today. Mrs. Arroyo will immediately proceed to the African Union (AU) Summit scheduled on Aug. 30-31. The 53-member AU is the premier institution and principal organization for the promotion of accelerated socio-economic integration of the African continent. Libya currently sits as AU chair

The Special AU Summit coincides with the celebrations marking the 40th Anni-versary of the Libyan Revolution. Liby-an Leader Col. Muammar Qaddafi invited the President to attend the Special Summit and the anniversary ceremonies

scheduled for Sept. 1. The summit will discuss peace and se-curity issues in the African continent, in-

cluding international anti-piracy in the Somali coast. At the sidelines of the Special AU Sum mit, the President will have a rare oppor-tunity to engage the leaders of African states and push for stronger relations with the African continent.

On Sept. 1, Mrs. Arroyo will meet with
the leaders of Libya, Sri Lanka and Pakistan.
In her bilateral meeting with Qaddafi,
the President will express the Philippines' gratitude for Libya's historic and continu ing role in the peace and development process in Mindanao and for hosting a

process in Mindanao and for investiga-good number of Filipino workers. Libya, under Qaddafi, was instrumen-tal in the conclusion of the 1976 Tripoli Agreement and the 1996 Final Peace Agreement between the Philippine gov-Agreement between the Philippine gov-ernment and the Moro National Libera-tion Front (MNLF).

The Philippines and Libya signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) in 2000 to enhance and facilitate joint co-

employment.

Mrs. Arroyo will also express the Philippines' commitment to convene the 2nd RP-Libya Joint Commission Meeting (JCM) to further increase economic, trade

and investment cooperation between the two countries.

Meanwhile, the President will exchange views and experiences with Sri Lanka on counter-terrorism efforts when she meets President Mahinda Rajakasi

She will also push for increased trade

between the two countries The President will also sit down with Pakistani President Yousaf Raza Gillani. The meeting will be timely, as the two countries will celebrate 60 years of dip-lomatic relations on Sept. 8. She will discuss the planned visit of the Bishop-IlJana Conference to Pakistan in

Bishop-Ulama Conference to Pakistan in October this year. The BUC fosters inter-

cess in Mindanao. On Aug. 31, President Arroyo is expected to meet with President Abdoulaye Wade of Senegal; President Blaise Compaore of Burkina Faso; President Amadou Toumani Toure of the Republic of Mali; and Captain Moussa Dadis Camara, President of the National Council for Democracy and De-velopment of the Republic of Guinea.
